A message from Rev. Aaron Moad

Good morning,

In today's reading from the Gospel According to Matthew 22:1 -14, Jesus tells the religious leaders he was talking to last week another a parable known as the "Parable of the Wedding Feast." This is a challenging story which tells us a profound message about God's invitation to his kingdom, how we should respond to that invitation, and the importance of being properly dressed for the occasion.

In the parable, a king prepared a lavish wedding feast for his son. He sent out his servants to call those who were invited to the wedding, but they refused to come. Undeterred, the king sent more servants with a message to come to the wedding, emphasising the richness of the feast. However, like the wicked tenants from last week's reading they ignored the invitation and mistreated and killed the messengers.

Faced with this resistance, the king decided to invite anyone and everyone from the streets, both good and bad, to ensure that his banquet hall was filled. When he entered the hall to meet the guests, he noticed a man not wearing the correct wedding attire. He asked the man how he had come in without proper attire, and the man was speechless. As a result, he was bound and cast out into the outer darkness.

The parable ends with Jesus' statement, "For many are called, but few are chosen".

What lessons can we learn from the reading?

God's generous invitation: The king's initial invitation to the wedding feast symbolises God's calling to us. He invites us into a relationship with him, offering blessings, grace, and eternal life through faith in Jesus Christ. This invitation is extended to all, regardless of their background or past.

Responsiveness to God's Call: The parable highlights various responses to God's invitation. Some outright reject it, preoccupied with worldly concerns or through complete indifference. Others may even oppose God's message. However, there are those who eagerly accept the invitation and experience the richness of God's love and grace in their lives.

Proper Attire reveals a heart of repentance: The guest without the wedding garment reminds us that, while all are welcome, we must accept the call and come with hearts of repentance and faith. The wedding garment symbolises the righteousness and purity that come from a relationship with God through Christ. Our outward actions should reflect the transformation that occurs within our hearts.

The Chosen Few: The parable concludes with the statement, "For many are called, but few are chosen." While God invites all, not all accept the invitation. The 'chosen' are those who respond to the call, put on the wedding garment of faith, and live in accordance with God's will.

How are we to respond to God's invitation?

Accept the Invitation: God invites each of us into a relationship with Him. His invitation is an expression of His love and desire for us to be part of His kingdom. He won't force us to come into his presence we have a choice, we can choose to reject His invitation like the people the king invited early in the story. The Parable of the Wedding Feast is a reminder of God's invitation to a life of abundance, joy, and grace in His kingdom.

Will you accept His call?
