A message from Rev. Aaron Moad

Listening and Living: A Faith that Serves and Sits

This week's readings from *Deuteronomy 6:4–9* and *Luke 10:38–42* bring us into two sacred spaces—one filled with commandment, the other with conversation. In both, we hear a central truth: loving God is not just something we feel, and it's not just something we do. It is both.

Deuteronomy gives us the Shema, Israel's most central prayer: "Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. Love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength." This love isn't just t a concept. It's a love that God tells us teach to our children, to speak about in our homes and everywhere we go, it's a love that fills our entire being. It's lived. It moves. It shows up in daily life.

And in *Luke 10*, we meet two sisters—Martha, busy with the work of hosting Jesus, and her sister Mary, sitting at His feet, listening. Martha is frustrated that she's doing all the work. But Jesus gently tells her that *Mary has chosen the better part, and it will not be taken from her.*

Is Jesus rejecting service in favour of stillness? No. He's reminding us that all true service begins in a place of listening. And all real contemplation is meant to shape how we live. Christian life is not a tug-of-war between being like Mary or being like Martha. It's a rhythm that holds both.

This week's Scriptures invite us to embrace three important truths:

1. Loving God begins with listening.

"Hear, O Israel..." The first word of the Shema isn't "go" or "do"—it's "hear." The life of faith begins by tuning our ears to the voice of God. Mary wasn't being passive; she was practicing the most important commandment—listening in love. Before we rush to serve or speak, we need to hear what God is saying. We need stillness. We need space to receive.

And sometimes that stillness feels unproductive. But it is essential. Without it, we serve from exhaustion, not love. Mary shows us the heart of discipleship: sit, listen, receive.



2. The rhythm of faith is both doing and being.

It's easy to criticize Martha, but let's not forget—Jesus was sitting in a house made clean and welcoming because of her. A faithful life means hearing and doing, loving and living, serving and sitting. Jesus doesn't scold Martha for serving—He invites her to be present with Him in the midst of it. Her mistake wasn't what she was doing, but that she forgot why she was doing it—and for whom she was doing it. Martha's hands and Mary's heart aren't enemies—they're both needed.

The Shema tells us to love God with all our being, with everything that we do and all that we are. That includes the meals we cook, the homes we tend, the jobs we work, and the people we help.

3. Faith is a balance of heart, soul, and strength.

Jesus teaches that Mary's posture of listening is "the better part"—but not the *only* part. The goal isn't to choose Mary *or* Martha. The goal is to live like Jesus, who often withdrew to pray *and* fed the hungry. He taught the crowds *and* washed feet. Our Christian life is at its best when our contemplation fuels our compassion, and our service flows from the still centre of God's love.

So What Now?

Maybe you feel like Martha—rushed, stressed, unnoticed. Or maybe you long to be like Mary, but your life won't slow down. The invitation is not to choose one over the other, but to bring both into rhythm. Hear God voice. Live God's love. Sit and serve. Listen and act.

Let the love of God shape every moment—when you're at the table, in the car, folding laundry, or sitting in silence. That's where real faith lives.
