A message from Rev. Agron Moad

True treasure - rich toward God

In this week's readings—Luke 12:13–21 and 1 Timothy 6:6–10, 17 –19—we're invited to take a hard look at something most of us think about every day: money. Jesus tells a parable about a man who builds bigger barns to store his wealth, only to die that very night. Paul, writing to Timothy, warns about the dangers of craving riches and offers a better way: being "rich toward God." These passages are not about guilt—they're about freedom. They ask us: What is your treasure? And what do you put your trust in?

Here are three honest, grace-filled invitations from these scriptures:

1. Wealth isn't wrong—but worshiping it is.

Jesus doesn't condemn the rich man because he had a good harvest being wealthy isn't a problem. The problem was what he did with it—and what he believed about it. He placed his wealth above his relationship with God. He thought money could guarantee his future, his comfort, and even his soul's security: "Soul, you have ample goods laid up for many years; relax, eat, drink, be merry." He didn't even think about God, he didn't consider God's plan.

It's a dangerous illusion. Paul echoes this when he says, "The love of money is a root of all kinds of evil." Money itself doesn't corrupt, money in itself isn't evil, but the love of it—the misplaced trust, the obsession, the belief that if we just have a little more, we'll finally be okay is the issue.

The truth is, money can become an idol, but money can't love us back but God does. It can't truly bring peace, but God does. It can't truly save us, but God does. and we can't take it with us, but God is always with us.

2. Contentment is a holy practice.

It seems that the more we have the more we want. We're never truly satisfied with what we have. But contentment doesn't come from having and gathering more stuff. Paul writes, "There is great gain in Godliness combined with contentment." In a world that



constantly tells us to upgrade, more is better, accumulate, and compete, contentment is a quiet act of resistance. It says: *I have enough because God is enough.*

That doesn't mean we stop working hard or stop caring about finances. But it does mean we learn to hold what we have with open hands. We shift from hoarding to gratitude, from fear to trust.

And here's the beautiful irony: when we stop chasing more, we actually find peace.

3. Be rich toward God.

Jesus ends his parable with a challenge: "So it is with those who store up treasures for themselves but are not rich toward God." Paul picks up the same theme: "command the rich not ... to set their hopes on the uncertainty of riches but rather on God... to do good, to be rich in good works, generous, and ready to share." In God's economy, real wealth is measured not by what we keep, but by what we give. Not by the size of our savings, but by the depth of our trust. Generosity becomes a way of worship, a way of anchoring our hearts in the Kingdom of God.

So what now?

Maybe money has been a source of stress for you. Maybe it's been a source of pride. Maybe you're just trying to keep your head above water. Wherever you are, Jesus meets you there—not to shame you, but to invite you into something better. He says, "Life does not consist in the abundance of possessions." Paul says, "Take hold of the life that really is life." That's not just good advice. That's the gospel.

Because in the end, we don't trust in barns or bank accounts. We trust in a generous God who has already given us everything in Christ.
